Take-Home Injectable Opioid Agonist Treatment

What is take-home iOAT?

Take-home iOAT is a prescription of injectable opioid agonist treatment (iOAT) medication that can be injected outside of the clinic without the direct observation of a clinic staff member

How can I safely inject my take-home medication off-site?

- Have someone you trust close by who is trained in overdose response
- Inject at an overdose prevention site or supervised consumption site
- If you have a cell-phone and live in BC, use the **LifeGuard app** which will help notify paramedics if an overdose happens. This app can be downloaded at https://lifeguarddh.com/
- **Clean hands** with soap and an alcohol swab
- **Rotate the sites** where you inject
- It is strongly recommended that you **talk to** your prescriber before using alcohol
- Talk to your prescriber about safely timing your dose if you are **taking any other** prescription medications

How can I store and transport my medication?



Use a lockbox if needed to store vour medication at room temperature. The clinic will provide you with a lockbox.

Dispose used syringes in a sharps container. You can exchange a full container for a new one at the clinic.






Only share your treatment plan with people that you trust to prevent theft.

Remove any personal information that may be on your prescription bottle before you throw it away.







The remaining doses of the prescription (for the next 24 hours) are given to you to **take with you** off-site

You can **iniect** your take-home dose(s) outside of the clinic

When can I follow up with my prescriber?

When you begin your treatment you will meet with your prescriber for weekly appointments, followed by monthly appointments.

Consider discussing these things with your prescriber or with other staff at the clinic:

- If there are **changes to your health** status
- If you experience challenges with injecting (eg. collapsed vein, abcess)
- If there are changes to your personal or social circumstances (eg. housing changes)
- If your doses have been lost or stolen
